Lisa Bayer is the director of the University of GeorgiaPress and the immediate past-president of the Association of University Presses. A thirty-year veteran of scholarly publishing, she has worked at the University of Illinois Press, Penn State University Press, Minnesota Historical Society Press, and Southern Illinois University Press. Bayer is the principal investigator for the Georgia Open History Library, funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, an executive committee member for the New Georgia Encyclopedia, and a board member of the Athens Historical Society.

Brian Peterson, Ph.D., is the vice president for academic affairs at LaGrange College and has over thirty years of experience in higher education. He began his academic career as an economics instructor and has held a range of faculty and leadership appointments at Central College, Manchester College, and Indiana University. Peterson's research, covering economics as well as pedagogical and leadership topics, has been published extensively, and his insights on economic issues have been sought by broadcast media.

Alonzo Sexton, M.D., is the president and founder of ATL Orthopedics, a private orthopedic practice that focuses on representative care and new technology and specializes in the treatment of sports injuries. He is also the CEO and founder of nCight, a service that uses blockchain technology to unlock patient and physician data to support independent physicians. Sexton received his M.D. from Emory University and has served as an athletics team physician for the University of Georgia and Georgia State University. He is involved in several nonprofit organizations and is a graduate of Leadership Atlanta and a fellow of the Herndon Directors Institute.
